I ran my

platform on securing the funds necessary to address the financial inequities between pharmacy students, which again was an issue that was further magnified by the pandemic. From that perspective, I am especially proud of my partnership with Mint Health and Drugs, where together we developed a bursary program that awarded \$2000 to deserving pharmacy students who needed a "helping hand". This program has continued onto this year, and I am excited for it to be a permanent fixture that APSA is able to offer to pharmacy students for the foreseeable future. Although I am now on the tail end of my fourth year of pharmacy school and these previous advocacy roles now seem like a distant memory, they do however instill in me a sense of confidence that I will be successful in being a strong advocate for the profession as a future practicing pharmacist.

Despite boasting the largest scope of pharmacy practice in the country, Alberta still needs strong pharmacist leaders who are willing to push the boundaries of what is expected of the profession. For myself, this is how I envision the evolution of my previous role as a student advocate will proceed once I become a practicing pharmacist; by becoming involved in formal leadership.
